The Workshop @Kreativquartier, HALLE 6

On November 8th members of the Departments of Mobility and of Labor and Economic Development teams in Munich, GIZ Harare, as well as members of the responsible unit of urban mobility in Harare teamed up with involved artists in a workshop at "Kreativquartier" in Munich. The Harare team joined via video call.

What happened there? The participants connected and exchanged plans. They celebrated first achievements and reviewed the status-quo. Then they rolled up their sleeves and brainstormed until they had created a strong vision for the project.









Aligned like this, they started to further develop a sustainable mobility concept that changes the image of cycling in Harare with the help of art.

The Event @Kreativquartier, HALLE 6

At a subsequent event on November 10th the artistic vision was presented by the artists Nyasha Jeche, Marcus Zvivanashe and Markus Heinsdorff. Their plans for a festival that celebrates sustainability and the cycling culture in 2024 include:

- closing down the Copa Cabana Square (busy central square in Harare) for cars
- producing art that enables visitors to get into contact with the local community
- tables with photos of the international bike culture to bring ideas to Harare
- an installation of old and worn out bike tires and use it for a kinetic experience
- a travelling exposition on sustainability and mobility in Zimbabwe curated by five additional local artists which offers interaction and inspiration

Ultimative goal of their vision: Sensitize people for importance of climate change and sustainability and engage with them via interactive tools and art.

After the artistic vision Camilla Huys from Munich DLED Team, Laura Sanchez Serrano of the Munich DAC and by Ana Carolina Cortes, GIZ representative for Harare shed light on the challenges and achievements of the collaboration so far. The event was documented by Visual Recording artist Britta Krondorf and a camera team. For the afterparty food and drinks were served and the band Pamuzinda performed wonderful music from Zimbabwe. It was a very inspiring evening full of fruitful networking and mutual appreciation.











Biggest Insights

In promoting a modern cycling culture, art can become a very strong driver for socioecological change. Art also creates a new channel to encourage people to change their behavior in terms of sustainable development, and it also reaches new target groups – children and young adults, for example.
